Key Takeaways

Survey data for this research includes 9,966 responses from surveys collected nationally via online web panels October 16-19 and October 25-27.

- The Argentina bailout presents a messaging opportunity, but awareness of the Argentina bailout is currently low compared to other recent issues.
 - Only 51% of voters have heard at least a little about the \$40 billion Argentina bailout, compared to 76% who have heard at least a little about the East Wing demolition.
- Voters overwhelmingly oppose the bailout and believe the Trump administration should prioritize domestic issues instead.
 - Baseline opposition to the bailout stands at 62%, vs. only 15% support. And notably, only 27% of Trump voters support the bailout.
 - Large majorities (80%+ of voters) believe the Trump administration should prioritize domestic issues, like preventing healthcare premium increases, over the bailout.
- Even with partisan framing, voters agree significantly more with Democrats against the Argentina bailout.
 - When presented with a Democratic argument about prioritizing domestic issues, voters side with Democrats by a 54-31 margin.
 - When presented with a Democratic argument about supporting American farmers, voters side with Democrats by a 51-33 margin.
- Messages that contrast the Argentina bailout with Trump's refusal to prevent healthcare premium increases are very effective.
 - A message discussing how Trump is "helping millionaires get richer while you can't afford healthcare" tested in the 93rd percentile among 800+ messages tested this year.

Only 51% of voters have heard at least a little about the Argentina bailout compared to 76% who have heard about the East Wing demolition

At a baseline, voters oppose the bailout by a wide 47 point margin

62% of voters, including 65% of swing voters and 41% of Trump voters, oppose the \$40 billion bailout to Argentina.

Only 15% of voters, including 13% of swing voters and notably only 27% of Trump voters, support the bailout.

Nearly 1 in 4 voters are unsure.

With a partisan framing and argumentation about impact on American farmers, voters still oppose the bailout by a 51-33 margin

51% of voters, including 48% of swing voters, agree more with Democrats that the Argentina bailout will hurt American farmers.

33% of voters, including 27% of swing voters, agree more with Republicans that the bailout will help prevent economic instability in Argentina.

The Trump administration is sending a \$40 billion bailout to Argentina to stabilize its economy.

Democrats oppose this because it hurts American farmers. Trump's trade war already cost farmers their biggest customer when China stopped buying American soybeans. Now Trump is helping Argentina, which also sells farm products, compete against American farmers who are already losing money and going out of business.

Republicans support this because helping Argentina prevents economic instability in South America. If Argentina's economy fails completely, it could create bigger problems that hurt U.S. interests across South America and possibly affect markets everywhere.

A Democratic argument that the money could be better spent on domestic priorities garners slightly more agreement

54% of voters, including 54% of swing voters, agree more with Democrats that the \$40 billion could be better spent on domestic priorities like healthcare costs.

31% of voters, including 20% of swing voters, agree more with Republicans that the bailout will help prevent economic instability in Argentina.

The Trump administration is sending a \$40 billion bailout to Argentina to stabilize its economy.

Argentina - Millionaires vs Your Medicine	he's helping millionaires get richer while you can't afford healthcare . Trump gave \$40 billion to Argentina, directly benefiting hedge fund billionaires who bet on that country. Meanwhile, 24 million Americans are losing affordable health insurance and families are going bankrupt from medical bills. Argentina - Healthcare Crisis	he's making your healthcare unaffordable in order to bail out Argentina . Trump gave \$40 billion to Argentina while 24 million Americans face skyrocketing health insurance costs.
